School Budget Development

The Board of Education had a Special Meeting on Monday, May 2, 2022, after the Town of Griswold, Board of Finance previously met and tasked the Board to review the submitted budget for any potential additional reductions. At that 5/2 meeting, the Board decided to move forward with the Initial Budget Proposal that was originally forwarded with no additional reductions.

At the Town of Griswold, Board of Finance Special Meeting on May 5, 2022, the BOF decided to make no adjustments to the Board's Initial Budget Proposal.

However, the budget development process is still very much underway and not finalized.

At the Town of Griswold, Board of Finance meeting on May 11, the public was allowed to comment on Town, Board of Education, and Capital budgets. There was another Town Meeting on the budgets on May 25.

The annual Town Budget Referendum is Tuesday, June 7, from 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Griswold Town Hall.



OUR ATHLETIC PLANT

Few schools, private or public, can boast of a campus affording such an abundance of athletic facilities as the Griswold High School. Set in a thirty-six acre plot ideally located are: four tennis courts, a baseball diamond, a hockey and practice field, a football field, a quarter mile track, and a two hundred twenty yard straight-away.

High schools have definitely accepted the responsibility of training the bodies of their students as well as their minds. Each student at Griswold High School must schedule a physical education class twice every week. School athletic fields are essential to a physical education program. The abundance of these facilities does not necessarily mean an emphasis on producing winning teams nor does it mean an overemphasis of athletics. Rather it means that this space will allow for the setting up of an intra-

mural program of athletic activity which will encourage every student to participate in some game. Sports for girls should be encouraged just as much as sports for boys. Our athletic program should aim at affording every student an opportunity to develop his body and at the same time to teach him how to enjoy wholesome pleasures.

The high school student's body must have first consideration in the use of our athletic plant, but the possibility of its use as a community recreational center and for summer playground programs must be considered. Tennis courts open to the public, a baseball field for community groups, and a soccer field for public use have long been needed in Griswold. Our athletic plant offers all these facilities. Some way will no doubt be found to make them available to the public.

The layout of the Griswold Public Schools campus in 1937. The original High School, now renovated and serving as Griswold Middle School, was built in 1936 and graduated its first class of students 85 years ago in 1937. The new high school was built in 1992. Since 1937, the GPS campus has expanded from 36-acres to 70-acres, added two new school buildings, and additional athletic fields that are used by the public.

Please consider supporting Griswold Public School's Committee on Campus Athletic Fields Revitalization Project that we covered on page 1 of <u>our April issue of the "Griswold Times"</u>. The Committee plans to renovate the existing track and field behind GHS to fix damage caused by drainage issues and years of use, to once again boast such an abundance of state-of-the-art, multi-use athletic facilities.

As we wrap up the first year of the Wolverines Forward Before & After School Program, we are so thankful for all the students, families, and staff that made it such a success!



ALUMNI PROFILE: JERMAINE FRAZER-PHILLIPS '13

Each month, a couple bags of delicious, aromatic coffee beans roasted in New England show up on my doorstep. Beyond the fact that the coffee gives me life most days, my coffee subscription supports a startup business venture by a fellow Griswold High School alumn, Jermaine Frazer-Phillips. For our May issue, I could not think of a more fitting feature than Jermaine and his coffee company, **Big Up Brew**. The first week of May was National Small Business Week, which is an obvious fit, but May is also Mental Health Awareness Month. "Big Up" is a Jamaican expression that refers to congratulating and honoring yourself. "We want our Big Up Brew family to believe in self-compassion and confidence, which directly impacts our personal lives, relationships, and communities," reads Big Up's website. Big Up Brew has become a staple in my pantry, and I was excited to catch up with Jermaine to learn more about his business and life since his time at GHS.



Jermaine, a first-generation Jamaican-American, graduated from Griswold High School as a member of the class of 2013. Although I was a few years ahead of him in school, I have

always had great respect for Jermaine. He was the quintessential Griswold student that took advantage of as many opportunities as he could. He worked hard in athletics, earning All-ECC and All-State recognition in Football, played basketball for a year before switching to Wrestling as his winter sport, and participated in outdoor track in the spring of his sophomore year. Jermaine was also active in the music program, as a member of Chamber Choir and a stage-hand in the spring musicals, and he still enjoys playing guitar and making music. Recognitions didn't stop there, as he also recalled winning a poetry slam, and naturally, being crowned Mr. GHS his senior year.

Following graduation from Griswold, Jermaine attended Suffield Academy preparatory school for a year to play Football and Wrestle. While there, he brought his love of music with him and started a Men's Choir. Ultimately, his football reel at Suffield helped him be recruited to play NCAA DIII Football at Ohio Wesleyan University (Defensive End, team caption his senior year), where he pursued International Studies. Just as he was in his time at Griswold and Suffield, Jermaine was highly engaged in his program and student life. He served as co-chair on the International Studies student board and was one of three students to receive an award for Outstanding Achievement in International Studies. You could say that wherever he goes, Jermaine has been the cream that rises to the top. Upon graduation from OWU, he moved to Chicago where he started his career as a cyber insurance broker. As a passion project, he spent time interviewing and producing podcasts with Chicago-based entrepreneurs and creatives and loved helping them amplify their voices. Making connections with other creatives helped Jermaine realize two things: one, he wanted to move back to New England, and two, it inspired him to start his own business with the goals of giving back to his community and diversifying the food and beverage industry.

Jermaine moved back to Connecticut in 2019 and now lives in Avon with his fiancé, Nicole. While working as a marketing sales professional at HubSpot, he started Big Up Brew and officially launched the company in April 2021. "Starting a business is difficult, but being unhappy is more difficult," he noted, referring to losing interest in past positions. "Just go for it and chase happiness!"

To Jermaine, coffee is a bridge to commonality. He shared experiences of sitting with people who have different backgrounds, cultures, languages and beliefs than his own, but they were able to connect over coffee.

For now, Big Up Brew is primarily sold online at bigupbrew.com. Jermaine is already investing back into his business to do some rebranding and gear up for some exciting changes. He hopes to expand his coffee brand into a coffee food truck, and eventually a café. Since launching last year, Jermaine has been busy building relationships in the Hartford area; you can find Big Up Brew at farmers markets and pop-up events in Hartford county, as well as at Hartford Prints and Semilla Café + Studio. 
